Enlargement in the geopolitical age The European Union, Moldova, and the European Political Community

Thursday, 18th May from 18h00 to 20h00, Radisson Blu Leogrand Chisinau

The Russian invasion of Ukraine marks a *Zeitenwende* for the European Union's geopolitical ambitions. It also brings enlargement back on the EU's strategic map, albeit in a renewed configuration. In June 2022, the European Council approved Ukraine and Moldova's bid to join the EU and granted Georgia European perspectives. The expansion of the EU's accession policy onto the shores of the Black Sea is a watershed for the EU's geostrategic ambitions. But it takes place against the backdrop of limited achievements in the Western Balkans, twenty years after the Thessaloniki Summit, and eroding credibility in EU accession matters. In Moldova, these European perspectives are a godsend for reformist forces, but they also hinge on a series of fundamental issues undermining the country's accession process. In the meantime, Chisinau prepares to host the next Summit of the European Political Community. What course can Moldova set for itself in the new geopolitical context? How serious is the EU in its expansion of the accession policy to the East? Should the accession policy be reformed to better address the geopolitical challenges in the East? What lessons should the EU and Moldova learn from the experience of the Western Balkans? And what is the potential of the European Political Community in this context?
